Business Meeting Minutes

8 Oct 2008

This prior to the meeting, Susan Davis of the Pregnancy Decision Health Centers gave a presentation about PDHC and the work they do, especially in preventing abortions by offering help, support, and counseling to women who feel overwhelmed by their pregnancy.

Meeting opened at: 7:51pm

Roll of Officers: Trustee 2 Year – Excused, All other officers Present

Reading of the Minutes: Wayne Patterson moved that the minutes be accepted as published. Terry Reine seconded. Motion passed.

Chaplain's Report: (Fr. Jim or Deacon Hector) Deacon Hector asked for prayers for Fr. Jim's mother, Ruth Klima, who suffered a severe stroke and is not expected to live more than a few days. He also spoke about deceased Knight Bob McDonald and asked for prayers for his family during this trying time.

Next, he addressed the issue of church mailboxes. He said there is a lot of controversy about a proposal to remove the mailboxes and stated that no decision has been made yet to remove the mailboxes. No new mailboxes are being created, but until a final decision has been made, the current mailboxes will remain. The removal of the mailboxes is being considered because we are so short of space at Seton and the area where the mailboxes are could be used for offices or something else. He told us that Maureen Patterson has been asked to keep track of votes either way so we should let her know how we feel about this issue.

Finally, he shared some personal observations about abortion and how we must continue to oppose abortion. While there are many ways we can do this, PDHC is a very good organization to support.

Report on Admissions: (Mark Knight or any other Brother Knights with a Form 100) No report.

Communications: Our council received a nice thank you note from seminarian Michael Connaughton for the money we sent him last month. The council requested that Mark Borys invite Michael to our next meeting so we can meet him.

Grand Knight's Report:

Reminder that second Pancake Breakfast is this Sunday (12-14). Santa will be visiting with the kids. If you can help, please do so. If you cannot help, at least bring your family and enjoy breakfast with us. Brother Jerry Lowery will be taking the new digital photos of Santa with the children.

Tom Weitzel will also be selling childrens books during the pancake breakfast, with 10% of proceeds being donated to our council. We need some knights who can come help him unload his inventory on Sunday morning.

Fraternal Audit is in the works – 2nd bi-annual financial audit will be conducted in early January.

Free Throw Contest – still looking to see who volunteered to head this up. If no one steps up, the contest is in jeopardy of not being held. Mike Croyle said Dave McAllister expressed interest in this and asked for the packet. A new packet has been ordered and will be given to Dave.

Two items from Brother Bud Joos, who could not attend tonight :

Pandora is looking for Knights to sing along with Resurrection Choir for 9:30am Mass on Christmas Morning. Practices are on Wednesdays at 6:30pm.

The "Pew Crew" will be going into action to clean the Church Pews prior to Christmas Masses. This will be at 9:00 am on Tuesday, December 16. Please let me know tonight if you wish to volunteer for either or both activities!

Treasurer's Report: (Bob Eisenacher) Bob reported on the Financial status of the Council

Financial Secretary's Report: (Mark Borys) Mark reported the on the income and expenses of the Council:

Harry Clyburn moved that the bills and receipts be accepted as read. Wayne Patterson seconded. Motion carried.

Trustee's Report: (Jesse Garcia, Dick Petersen, Mike Croyle) No Report.

Chancellor's Report: Vacant.

Advocate's Report: (Gene Ebert) Gene stated that all Knights are brothers and we should always remember that.

Report of Service Committees/Programs:

Membership: (Mark Knight) Two new Knights were added to our council at the Resurrection Church 1st degree: Joel Potts and James Hare. We welcome these new Knights.

Program Director: (Frank Hare) No report.

Church Director: (Ray Creamer) No report.

Squires: (Steve Malott) Steve reported that the Squires are very active and busy planning for several events:

Pancake breakfast – the Squires will help with set up Saturday evening.

Dodgeball tournament – they are well into planning and have things under control. They have not heard from any other Circles yet.

They are considering starting an aluminum can recycling program to raise money for the Circle. They would like to get a recycling bin on Seton grounds to collect aluminum. The Squires would empty and clean this bin and take the cans to a recycling center for cash. Of course, this depends on getting Fr. Jim's permission and finding a bin somewhere. They are looking into this further.

March for Life – two Squires intend to go to the March on our Council sponsored bus.

Respect Life: (Edd Chinnock) Edd reported that the Respect Life commission will be going to a Pickerington area nursing home for Christmas caroling on December 21 after the 11:15 Mass. All are welcome to join us – the more the merrier! The home residents really love it when small children come.

Edd moved that the Council spend up to \$500 to help defray the cost of SPY students who attend the March for Life on the Council supported bus. Bob Eisenacher stated that \$450 was budgeted for this. Edd stated that the increased amount was so we could also use this to help the Squires who wish to go to the March. Harry

Clyburn and Steve Mallot seconded the motion. The motion was tabled until the next meeting due to the amount.

Report of Standing Committee's:

Bus for Respect Life Trip: (Mike Croyle) Mike reported that we have 37 confirmed and paid bus riders and should easily have the required minimum 40 riders by Dec. 15. He has \$4800 for the trip so far. He requested \$2806 be sent to the bus company to pay for the bus (\$2906 bus cost minus \$100 deposit already paid). As this was already approved by the Council and comes out of the \$4800 already paid for the bus trip, no vote was required.

Statue: (Jesse Garcia) Jesus reported that the statue might be in Miami awaiting customs inspection. We should know soon.

Kroger Cares Program: (Terry Reine) Terry is still trying to contact state rep.

Development Committee Magnet Sales: (Mark Borys) They will be selling magnets at this Sunday's pancake breakfast.

Pancake Breakfast: The first pancake breakfast went well.

Scholarship (Gene Ebert) Scholarship form is on our website and will be in the bulletin soon. Scholarships are open to any child or grandchild of a Knight. The student must attend a Catholic school and be in 4th thru 12th grade. They need not attend school locally – they could even be in another state.

Unfinished Business:

Charity List: Tabled from last month. Discussion was held at the first Saturday meeting, and a list of charities which received donations in the past 3 years was developed by the Treasurer. The Grand Knight asked the Treasurer to further develop next year's budget to create sub categories based on the main programs of the Knights – Church, Council, Community, Respect Life, and Youth. We will then ask those leaders of each program to participate in the development of the 2009/2010 budget so that programs and charities will be represented. This was tabled again until next month.

Fall Festival: Wayne reported that Seton parish paid the Council \$45 to cover the cost of new parishioner meals at the festival.

New Business:

Chancellor vacancy: Harry Clyburn asked if he could rescind his resignation and continue as chancellor. Council approved.

From: Days Of Devotion: Daily Meditations from Pope John XXIII.

This meditation was written by the Sheppard of our Assembly; he could be speaking directly to us. Pope John writes:

**6 January
THE EPIPHANY**

After the shepherds came the Magi kings, the great ones of the earth, who traveled from far away to honor the divine King and Savior of the world. Just as the shepherds rejoiced to hear the angels' good news, so the Magi too welcomed with joy the sign given them by the Lord: "We have seen his star in the east and have come to worship him."

In the wise king's words we must admire the eagerness and earnestness with which they carried out their purpose, and the generosity of their gifts. They represent all who are endowed with worldly goods and other advantages, and use them according to the holy inspirations they receive from on high.

Considering these wonderful events from the human point of view we may think that the group of Magi kings who came to Bethlehem, representing the rich and powerful of this earth, seem more attractive to the common way of thinking, because they belong to a privileged class. It is obvious that is more pleasant to give than to beg. And yet we know that the blessed Gospel of Jesus teaches us a sublime lesson about this. Poverty does not signify misfortune or humiliation; and the rich are bound to do many works of mercy, besides satisfying the requirements of justice. For this reason it is easy to understand why at a certain moment Jesus, the Lord of the world, chose for the whole course of his life on earth a state of poverty and want, why he proclaimed the blessedness of those who have no possessions, and those who suffer, and threatened with grave punishments the rich who are unmindful of their duties.

Father David Schalk: The Boy, The Man, The Priest ... Part 3

Fr. Mike shared, "I was especially touched when, as a deacon, Dave drove all the way to North Dakota to visit my parish. He met with our high school youth and left an enduring impression on them, of a man who was fully engaged in the world they knew, and simultaneously rooted in, and on fire, with Christ." Quite an analysis by Fr. Mike!

Dave loves to travel and has attended every trip available to him throughout his life.

Of course, these were all underwritten by his father's credit cards. Once, Larry called Dave to ask him if he were going to Mexico next month and Dave gave his standard response, "Well, yes, but not before I go to Phoenix, and Yuma, and Tucson."

Fr. Dave entered Mundelein Seminary in 2004. He met seminarian Nick Parker and became friends with him through an accountability group there. Nick is now Fr. Nick Parker, working in St. Mary Parish in Salina, Kansas. His interview revealed that one of the professors at Mundelein classified Dave as, 'freakishly smart.' Fr. Nick added,

"Let's not forget that Dave is one of the most hilarious people you will ever meet."

Fr. Nick confessed to me that he and Dave are both addicted to Wendy's and Chipotle restaurants. He also said, "I think we can say that all of Dave's traits and talents are now magnified through the priesthood. It's kind of like layperson Dave on steroids."

As a deacon, Dave visited Goodland, Kansas and stayed with Fr. Nick's family for a week. The people were very taken by Dave's engaging and likable personality. Fr. Nick's whole hometown parish just loved him and still ask about him today.

Fr. Nick has traveled numerous places with Dave. The greatest trip was when fifty of the seminarians at Mundelein went on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. It lasted from the first of December until the middle of February. Fr. Nick said of this trip, "It was absolutely amazing how much all of us grew in fellowship and in our spirituality on that trip. It was truly incredible."

Dave remembers the Holy Land pilgrimage his third year in theology as, "Definitely, one of the best experiences of my life." He feels that his relationship with Our Blessed Mother grew stronger the four weeks they stayed in Bethlehem. He knows he has a greater understanding of her love for Christ, and thus Christ's love for us. Fr. Dave shared this beautiful thought, "It was nice to experience the quiet, cold Palestinian air at night. To imagine Mary, keeping her son warm, that first Christmas."

Fr. Dave expressed his gratitude to the people here at Seton parish with these words. "Throughout my time in the seminary, I was always encouraged by parishioners wishing me well and offering prayers for me. There have been countless individuals at Seton who have shown me how to live my faith. The parish is filled with saints-and saints beget saints. It seemed as if devotion and dedication was never lacking at Seton, and that made me want to become more devoted to Christ and dedicated to His plan for my life."

Fr. Dave loves being a priest. He says, "So far, the best part of

being a priest is being able to celebrate the sacraments. I still have yet to wrap my mind around the fact that I act in the person of Christ, able to celebrate Mass and forgive sins in the sacrament of reconciliation. This is both a privilege and a joy."

The vocation of Holy priesthood has changed Fr. Dave's life in a variety of ways. The one thing he wanted to share with all of us was this. "I have been introduced to a tremendous amount of people in the Church and made friends from all over the world. Being a seminarian and a priest allowed me to make connections that would otherwise be impossible. There is nothing quite so small as the universal Catholic Church, and I have been able to get a feel for the universal nature of the Church over the past eight years through friends that I have made."

Throughout these interviews, I have learned that Fr. David Schalk is a remarkable and spiritual young man, with an ever deepening love for Christ and his church. Jim Kuebler says, "He will be a 'breath of fresh air' for the priesthood." Bob Moraine's opinion, "Fr. Dave is an especially exciting blessing, and with God's grace, his unique gifts and talents will serve God's people well." Fr. Nick's quote, "Without a doubt, his ministry will inspire those around him to grow in their faith as Catholics, and hopefully be an inspiration for more youth to consider the priesthood." Fr. Mike elaborated, "Fr. Schalk is a gift from God. I wouldn't want to put undue pressure on him or inflate his ego, but he does embody the hope we ought to have for an energetic, vibrant and relevant Church. He joins a growing host of other young priests that are giving the Church a fresh way of engaging our youth and young adults." Incredible statements, from those who know Dave well.

Dr. Scott told me that Dave's ordination reception was the most like a wedding reception she had ever attended without a bride present. She asked me to ask Fr. Dave this question. "What do you feel you can do to continue to cherish the bride of Christ, the church?"

Fr. Dave's answer was as follows, "Staying close to Christ, who cherishes the Church like no one else, is the key. My hope is to see the Church through the eyes of Christ. That is, with compassion and love, and stir up a desire to give my life to the Church every day, just as Christ gave His life for the church on the cross."

I would like to end this article with a quote from Fr. Dave's parents. Larry and Bernie Schalk feel this way. "We are blessed beyond description and imagination by having a son who is a priest. It is an honor which both humbles us, and makes us proud, all at the same time. It is a breathtaking joy that cannot be comprehended; just experienced. Any parent who is fortunate enough to have a son interested in the priesthood should encourage and promote such a vocation. It is a vocation that is more noble, more meaningful, more important, more timely and urgently needed than any other career on earth. Imagine being responsible for shepherding the souls of an entire parish to everlasting life, for all eternity, forever. How can any other career top that? It is in a league by itself. The old sports saying, 'the thrill of victory and the agony of defeat' pale in comparison to the outcome for the souls in the care of the parish priest. What better way is there to ultimately meet the One who says, 'I Am Who Am.' The Diocese of Columbus has gained a wonderful new priest. He will take many souls with him to heaven."

Respect Life: Happy New Year

Happy New Year from the Seton Respect Life group! We wish each and every one of you a happy, prosperous, and life filled year.

2008 was a year filled with pro-Life activities and challenges. We started the year with our annual bus trip to the March for Life in Washington, D.C. This trip was a challenge because at the last minute our Columbus K of C chapter decided not to sponsor a bus. We scrambled around and eventually hooked up with a group from Dayton that took a four day, three night trip. It was a wonderful experience and the extra time in DC allowed us to see some of the sights in our nation's capitol. For the first time, we attended the Rock Mass for Life the morning of the March and it was an awesome experience. To be in an arena with 20,000 young people really enjoying Mass and enthusiastically singing is something that must be experienced to be believed.

During Lent, we again put a Pac-N-Play in the gathering space to collect baby items for Pregnancy Decisions Health Centers. This has become a Lenten tradition at Seton and is a real tribute to the generosity of our parishioners. At our December K of C meeting, a PDHC representative again told us how much this means to PDHC and how much it helps their clients. She also told us about the impact PDHC has in reducing abortions in our area through offering pre-natal care and other help to women with crisis pregnancies and in caring for their new born children.

In the spring, we bought flowers and planted them in cups gaily decorated by Seton's religious education students. We then visited a nursing home and left each resident a flower to brighten their room. It is wonderful to see how such a small gift and a few loving words can lighten the hearts of the residents and brighten their day.

After a break for summer vacations and family time, we resumed activities in the fall by making baby blankets for Children's Hospital and social service agencies. About 10-15 people met in Hermann Hall to cut fleece fabric and tie fringe knots to make these blankets. The resulting blankets are soft, colorful blankets that cheer up children and give them something to snuggle with when they are hurting.

In October a few of us went to the PDHC fund raising dinner. The speakers were outstanding, especially keynote speaker Jill Stanek, who was a nurse in the Chicago area and spoke about holding infants born alive after abortions until they died. Her efforts on behalf of those infants have brought Jill national attention and helped pass the Born Alive Infants act.

Of course, this was an election year, so we were very active in

trying to educate people about the candidates' stances on Pro-Life issues. With a very Pro-Life ticket against a radically pro-abortion ticket, we thought this would be an easy task, but the election results showed otherwise. While we are disappointed that the pro-abortion ticket won handily, we cannot lose heart. We must continue to fight for those who cannot speak for themselves. The next big challenge will be to defeat the Freedom of Choice Act (FOCA), which, if passed, would invalidate ALL abortion restrictions in EVERY state.

In the recent election Washington joined its neighbor Oregon as the second state to legalize physician assisted suicide. This December the Montana Supreme Court legislated from the bench when it ruled that physician assisted suicide is legal in that state. These Culture of Life defeats show us that we must re-double our efforts to spread the word of Life.

In December we again went to the Pickerington Nursing home to sing Christmas carols and give cards to the residents. As always, they really enjoy our singing and seeing the children that come with us (Mark Heuser's grandchildren Christopher and Casey joined us as they have for several years). Maureen Patterson's dog, Jordan, was a big hit with many of the residents.

Because of the March for Life bus cancellation in January, our Council decided to sponsor its own bus for the 2009 trip. As of this writing, the bus is nearly full and will likely be full within the next few days. Mike Croyle has done a great job of coordinating this trip. A BIG THANKS to the council for agreeing to sponsor the trip this year!

So again, from all of us in the Pro-Life movement, have a Happy and Blessed New Year and keep promoting the Culture of Life! Please join us in any or all of our activities in 2009!
